And therefore, neither should we. We have just as much right to never allow these crimes to leave our memories and reject all plans by Afrika and Caricom politicians that are currently being made above our heads that will cause numerous new enslavement processes to occur. We will continue to advocate on our behalf. Maybe it is time that AU and monarchy lawyers review the documents from the Namibia decision, we know there is a copy circulating somewhere in the AU. "BY bypassing the Herero and Nama leaders to cut a state-to-state deal, Germany sought to buy immunity for future legal claims. This double standard is precisely why affected communities rejected the 2021 agreement. Two years later, traditional leaders from the Ovaherero Traditional Authority (OTA) and the Nama Traditional Leaders Association (NTLA), representing the direct descendants of the victims, launched a legal challenge in the Namibian High Court to invalidate the 2021 joint declaration. They argue that by excluding affected indigenous communities from negotiations, the Namibian government breached its duty to protect its citizens' rights and heritage."

"Unity" is an overused and exceedingly abused word, which has no more effect, particularly in our case. The Unfinished Revolution: Why Barbados Must Reclaim the Radical Legacy of Marcus Garvey

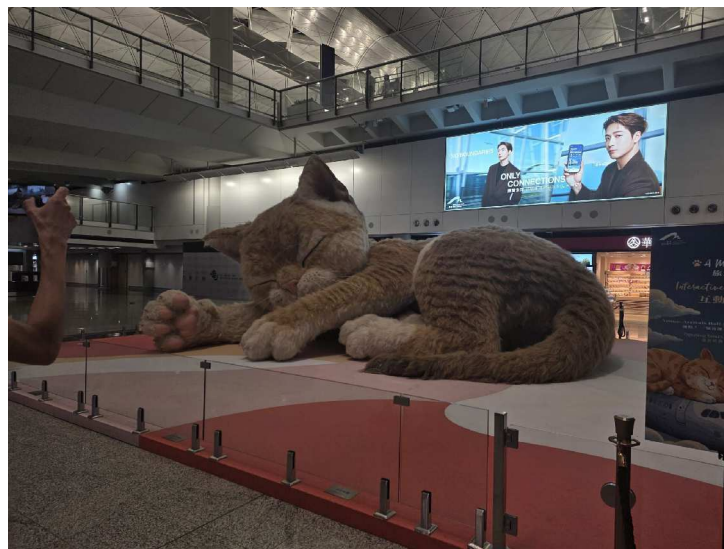

More than eighty years after his passing, the shadow of the Right Excellent Marcus Mosiah Garvey still looms large over the Caribbean. Yet in Barbados, a nation that recently shed its final constitutional ties to the British monarchy to become a republic, a troubling paradox remains.

We celebrate our independence, we host cultural pageants, and we decorate our heritage sites. However, the core of Garvey's philosophy—Black nationalism, economic self-reliance, and psychological emancipation—is profoundly absent from our contemporary institutions, policies, and social fabric.

By evaluating Barbados through a strictly Garveyite lens, it becomes evident that while the Union Jack has been lowered, the structural, psychological, and economic frameworks of colonialism remain firmly entrenched. We are a people celebrating a nominal freedom while remaining shackled by an unaddressed colonial legacy.



The Erasure of Garveyism from the Barbadian Classroom

The most critical failure in our national development is the complete absence of Garveyite philosophy in the school curriculum. Our education system remains a direct descendant of the colonial apparatus, designed to produce compliant civil servants and laborers rather than independent, self-determined thinkers.

The impact of this educational vacuum is devastating:

Historical Amnesia: Barbadian youth graduate with a deep understanding of European history but remain functionally illiterate regarding Black radical thought.

Psychological Dependency: Without Garvey's foundational teaching that "the first essential element of success is a collective confidence in self," generations of Afro-Barbadians have been conditioned to look outward—specifically to the Global North—for validation, expertise, and leadership.

Eradication of Pan-African Identity: By treating African history as a tragic footnote beginning at chattel slavery rather than a source of rich civilization, our schools inadvertently perpetuate the lie of Black inferiority

The Fracture of the Black Family vs. Garvey's Social Order

The modern Barbadian landscape is plagued by a fracturing social structure, characterized by a high rate of single-parent households and a lack of community-led generational wealth. This reality directly contradicts Marcus Garvey's philosophy.



Garvey viewed the strong, unified Black family as the primary economic and political unit of the global Black nation. He recognized that a race could not build an empire or resist systemic oppression if its foundational blocks were broken.

The normalization of unstable family structures in Barbados is not a natural cultural evolution; it is a lingering symptom of plantation dynamics where the Black family was deliberately systematically dismantled. By failing to actively repair and protect the Black family unit, Barbados remains vulnerable to social decay and economic exploitation.

The Normalization of Poverty and the Illusion of the "Quiet Life"

In Barbados, there is a dangerous, almost spiritualized acceptance of poverty. Phrases deeply embedded in our local lexicon suggest that being poor but "clean" or "god-fearing" is a noble state of existence.

This acceptance directly violates Garvey's teachings. Garvey fiercely rejected the weaponization of religion and culture to justify economic destitution. He taught that poverty was a race liability and an insult to Black dignity. Garveyism demands aggressive, unapologetic wealth creation, ownership of industries, and global trade. The passive acceptance of low wages, high costs of living, and systemic financial inequality in Barbados represents a complete abandonment of the strive for total self-reliance.
